New series to invigorate GCSE geography launched

The Geographical Association has launched a brand-new series of books designed to revitalise GCSE geography teaching: the ***GSCE Geography Teachers' Toolkit***. With themes common to most new GCSE specifications, this series is designed to help teachers take a fresh look at GCSE geography and enthuse, engage and motivate students to think and act as geographers.

The first three titles in this series have just been published:

- [*Is the Future Sussed? A study of urban living*](#) encourages students to assess the sustainability of a typical British town, consider the idea of an urban footprint and explore traffic and transport problems.
- [*Going Global? A study of our interconnected world*](#) helps students reflect on their place in a globalised world, exploring the global division of labour involved in making items that they consume, the role of the internet in their lives, and how TNCs make a big difference to their lives and lives of others around the world.
- [*For Richer and Poorer? A study of uneven development*](#) asks students to interrogate evidence for uneven development and critically evaluate different indicators and sources, before applying their understanding to suggest ways of reducing uneven development.
